The Massachusetts Medical Society and Alliance Charitable Foundation (Foundation) has worked tirelessly to increase access to quality health care throughout Massachusetts. By supporting free health care clinics and other accessible health care alternatives, we have ensured that thousands of Massachusetts residents get the care they need regardless of their coverage status. By investing in programing focused on public health issues, we have increased community wellness across the region.

Since its founding in 2000, the Foundation has granted more than \$3.5 million to 125 nonprofit organizations improving the health care of communities that have been historically marginalized or made vulnerable, awarded more than \$176,000 in international health studies grants to 123 medical students and residents who are pursuing international education focusing on under-resourced populations, and grown investments to more than \$2.5 million.

13 NONPROFITS WERE AWARDED \$175,000

to intervene in early predictors of poor health outcomes, such as health equity, poverty, food insecurity, and access to health care, serving more than 32,000 individuals.



BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES — \$35,000



- The **Lynn YMCA**, through a collaboration with the Lynn Community Health Center, will provide on-site behavioral health and therapeutic after-school programming for 500 adolescents.
- The **Old Colony YMCA** in Brockton will serve 500 individuals and families impacted by mental illness and addiction through the implementation of an Open Access Model for new clients to engage in behavioral health services and the expansion of current services.
- Through the New Directions Counselling Center at **Interfaith Social Services** in Quincy, the mental health needs of 3,200 impoverished people without health insurance or with inadequate coverage will be addressed.

HEALTH PROMOTION — \$10,000



- Through its Healthy Aging Program, **Ethos** will work to reduce isolation and prevent chronic disease among 3,425 of Boston's seniors by encouraging well-being and community through a diverse array of outreach strategies, community-based educational and social programs, and evidence-based health promotion workshops.

IMPROVING ACCESS TO CARE — \$55,000



- The **MetroWest Free Medical Program** will assist 600 individuals by providing immediate medical care to those who need it and connecting others with health resources within the community.
- **Health Care Without Walls** will provide free “bridging” health care to 1,100 vulnerable homeless women in the greater Boston area resulting in increased access to preventive health care, chronic disease management/prevention, reduced health care costs, and improved health outcomes.
- **Father Bill's & MainSpring's** Outreach Project will connect 160 people living outdoors across the Southeast region to health care and services, helping participants improve their health and exit homelessness.
- **Restoration Recovery Center** in Fitchburg will serve 500 individuals by increasing access to recovery programming, resources, behavioral health, and health care with the intent to both prevent illness and reduce costs to the community by preventing more serious complications through consistent care and attention.

QUALITY HEALTH CARE FOR MEDICALLY UNINSURED — \$35,000




- Through the development of a trilingual community-based free health care program, **Gratis Healthcare** will provide 2,500 uninsured people in the Framingham area with health care access.
- **The Sharewood Project** will serve 700 under- or uninsured clients from the Malden area by providing free health care and screenings, assisting with enrollment in health insurance programs, and collaborating with local medical providers to ensure continued patient care.

SOCIAL DETERMINANTS OF HEALTH — \$40,000



- **Amherst Survival Center's** Grocery Delivery Program expands access to the food pantry by providing food security to 1,500 area residents who have transportation barriers.
- **Our Neighbor's Table** will reach 5,000 individuals by providing Food Security 101 training sessions to the providers at Anna Jacques Hospital and its primary care network, first responders, and school nurses in northern Essex country to alleviate hunger and ultimately improve health.
- **Lovin' Spoonfuls** will serve an additional 12,500 individuals through the expansion of its food rescue and hunger relief operation in Worcester County, which will provide fresh, nutritious food to people in a region experiencing high levels of food insecurity.
