





Promoting Equitable Health Outcomes: Our Impact

June 1, 2024–May 31, 2025

Eight non-profits addressing the most vulnerable in our communities, received a total of \$96,420, with the majority of the funds awarded to free health programs supporting access to health care and behavioral health services, serving 14,000 individuals.

QUALITY HEALTH CARE SERVICES FOR THE UN- AND UNDERINSURED — \$71,420



- **Boston University Outreach Van Project** received \$10,000 to provide medically underserved communities of the Greater Boston Area with clothing, fresh produce, shelf-stable food, hygiene products, and social services, while also providing future physicians skills in community outreach.
- **Epworth Free Medical Program in Worcester** received \$15,000 to improve TB screening by increasing IGRA blood tests and providing coverage for confirmatory x-rays for underserved populations.
- **Gratis Healthcare in Framingham** received \$15,000 to continue providing basic health care access without barriers for uninsured or underinsured communities in the MetroWest and Greater Boston area.
- **Martin Luther King Jr. Family Services in Springfield** received \$1,420 for the Food Justice Fair organized by UMass Chan medical students in collaboration with local emergency food pantries to provide nutritional education, resources, and community connections.
- **St. Anne's and St. Peters' Free Medical Program in Shrewsbury and Worcester** received \$20,000 to provide health care services like TB screenings, laboratory testing, and radiology exams to uninsured and underinsured patients.
- **Worcester RISE for Health** received \$10,000 to provide primary and preventative care to un- and underinsured refugees and immigrants through culturally sensitive, trauma-informed services.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES — \$25,000



- **Addiction Referral Center in Marlborough** received \$15,000 for Project B.R.A.V.E., which offers recovery resources with transportation, care packages, housing funds, and coaching services at no cost to individuals in need.
- **Addiction Solutions of Nantucket** received \$10,000 to provide addiction treatment services, particularly Medication-Assisted Treatment, to those on the island regardless of ability to pay.
