# **From the President**

Assuming the presidency of the Massachusetts Medical Society during a pandemic presented unique challenges and opportunities. My astute predecessor, Dr. David Rosman, solidified the Society's commitment to advancing public health and being a leadership voice in addressing racism and related health disparities. Under the oversight of Executive Vice President Lois Cornell, the MMS pivoted to accomplishing impressive work remotely, and our members



adapted to the changed environment, holding virtual meetings to advance the Society's mission. I had the good fortune to lead an incredible group of committed staff and members — running committees, working with public health officials, and making their voices heard on behalf of patients and physicians.

What emerged as an urgent priority during my tenure as president was the dramatic exacerbation of a mental health crisis that was years in the making. Outrageous emergency department boarding levels; increases in substance use; lack of available resources, especially to already marginalized communities; and practice pressures such as prior authorization and staffing shortages, all contributed to distress for our patients and burnout among our members. Under the steady guidance of my friend and successor, Dr. Ted Calianos, the MMS is well positioned to continue to address this crisis and all the challenges we face.

I am proud of the resilience exhibited by our members and our staff through the year, particularly in confronting threats to health care, to public health, and to our profession. We met the moment and raised our voices in the face of divisiveness, racism, and inequality, and condemned threats against access to reproductive and gender-affirming care. And I am so grateful to all MMS members for what you do every day to provide patient care and improve care delivery.

# From the Executive Vice President

During this year, the Massachusetts Medical Society moved forward with the strength and purpose that have had a great impact throughout the pandemic. The resulting accomplishments and ongoing momentum are carrying us into 2022–2023.

The Society advocated for the shared interests of patients and the medical profession, addressed our members' needs, and provided a trusted leadership voice in health care — all at a time when critically needed.



- MMS advocacy helped to avert significant Medicare payment cuts, expand telehealth, address physicians' administrative burden, and improve access to care for vulnerable populations. We championed successful legislation to address health care workforce shortages and to reduce barriers to mental health care in the state.
- We continue to build a diverse membership through innovative policies and programming. Events this year included a "Black Women in Medicine" conference and networking for medical students and physicians from backgrounds that are under-represented in medicine.
- With allied organizations, we provided timely physician forums, up-to-date information, and briefings and Q&A sessions with the state Department of Public Health. Webinar topics ranged from "Trust and Public Health" and "Prioritizing and Preserving Psychological Health" to the science behind mRNA vaccines to diversity, equity, and inclusion in the practice of medicine and in health care workplaces.

Building on the foundational strength of our mission, the Medical Society was laser-focused on the highest priorities of members and patients. Guided by our strategic plan and a vision of equitable and high-quality care, the MMS is positioned for long-term success.



# MMS Builds Community, Value, and Opportunity for Physicians

The Massachusetts Medical Society, the state's largest physician-led organization, continued to be a source of camaraderie, education, and advocacy for physicians and patients, while maintaining a steady focus on diversity, equity, and inclusion in he



and inclusion in health care and the medical profession.

From among 25,018 members, hundreds this year actively participated in 40 MMS committees and seven member sections (including Residents and Fellows, Women Physicians, International Medical Graduates, and others). These groups continued to meet remotely through the fatigue and challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. Their work resulted in dozens of MMS initiatives, activities, and new MMS policies.



## **Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion**

During this second year of the MMS initiative on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, the Medical Society continued to focus on creating a welcoming environment for all with new programs, community building, and opportunities for leadership and mentoring. Many "firsts" included the following:

• The successful <u>Black Women in Medicine (BWIM)</u> conference attended by 100+ women of all ages and career stages. Of respondents to a post-activity survey, 95% rated it excellent/good.

- The new <u>Underrepresented Physicians of Tomorrow</u> <u>Award</u>. The MMS Minority Affairs Section began this annual award to recognize exemplary advocacy, scholarship, community engagement, and leadership among medical students and trainees.
- An online student networking event, "Tips for Success During Clinical Rotations and Beyond," presented by the MMS Committee on Diversity

in Medicine. Frank discussions among students, trainees, and faculty from diverse backgrounds included tips for finding a mentor and ways to address issues of inequity in patient care or institutional dynamics without risking one's own career progression.

Ongoing partnership with the Massachusetts Health and Hospital Association led to a second year of educational webinars focused on DHEI, including "Deracializing Kidney Diagnosis,""The ROI of DE&I: Building the Business Case," and a viewing of the powerful documentary *The Power to Heal*.



# New Benefits for Members: Corporate Partnership Program

With oversight from the MMS Committee on Membership, the Society launched the new <u>Corporate</u> <u>Partnership Program</u>. This member benefit provides access and savings for a growing list of products and services in personal travel, financial services, banking, and communications among other useful and economical services for members and their practices.



# Supporting and Advocating for Physicians, Patients, and Practice

The MMS's advocacy for physicians, patients, and medical practices continues to examine the development and impact of governmental policies through the lens of equity, and with great attention to the psychological health needs of patients and physicians that has approached crisis levels.

# **Prioritizing and Integrating Mental Health**

In May 2022, the MMS Annual Education Program, <u>Prioritizing and Preserving Psychological Health</u>, examined practical and policy strategies needed to identify and mitigate psychological distress among our patients and our provider staff, improve availability and equitable access to mental and behavioral health services, and instill a culture in health care that prioritizes psychological well-being for all.

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To help practices with the crucial work of integrating behavioral health, the MMS Committee on Mental Health and Substance Use, with the Committee on the Quality of Medical Practice, delivered the encompassing report <u>Integrating Mental Health and Substance Use Care</u> <u>in Your Practice</u>. It provides information physicians can use immediately and recommendations for important next steps for policy makers, educators, and others to improve practices and systems, physician education, payment practices, and outcomes reporting.

# **Successful Advocacy for Physician Practice**

Other wins for MMS advocacy for physician practice and for patients include the following:

- The prevention of Medicare payment cuts of nearly 10% planned to begin on January 1, 2022, by using strategic, repeated engagement with congressional leaders and launching a grassroots campaign with easy-to-use tools for members to reach their legislators.
- Addressing administrative burden by working with the Board of Registration in Medicine to streamline initial physician licensure, which will launch in coming months.
- Expansion of telehealth codes and parity in payment.



- Securing delay of state notice and disclosure requirements relative to surprise billing that were duplicative of federal requirements.
- Significant investments to address workforce shortages, including loan repayment for mental health professionals and the use of federal American Rescue Plan funds for retention and recruitment programs for human service and home health workers.
- Laying groundwork for passage of the state's Mental Health ABC Act: Addressing Barriers to Care to promote parity between mental and physical health, mandate coverage for an annual mental health exam, and curtail the emergency room boarding crisis.

# **Trusted Leadership Voice in Health Care and Continuing Education**

This year, the Medical Society's own words and actions, often combined with those of community partners and experts, provided a trusted leadership voice that has never been more important. The COVID-19 pandemic's disproportionate impact on vulnerable populations guided ongoing MMS pandemic-related efforts. Working closely with the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, other public health organizations, and specialty medical societies, the MMS prioritized advocacy, education, and communication related to prevention and mitigation that included social distancing, mask wearing, testing, vaccination, and treatment, and incorporated the issues of behavioral health.

# Public Statements and Information in a Challenging Time

Through proactive media relations and social media — urging protection to equitable access to reproductive care, recognizing important work of the public



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health officials and workers — the MMS communicated with members and the public. Online engagement with the MMS increased by more than 30% on social media platforms LinkedIn and Instagram. Engagement in the MMS member e-newsletter Vital Signs This Week increased by 40% over the prior year.

## Broad Range of MMS Education Programs Meet the Moment

A nationally recognized provider of continuing medical education (CME), the MMS continues to maintain its status of Accreditation with Commendation by the Accreditation Council for Continuing

Medical Education (ACCME), which acknowledges the Society's standard for educational quality and independence. The year's educational activities featured prominent faculty, provocative and timely topics, and strong attendance with positive feedback, including the following:

 <u>Nuclear Weapons — A Public Health Issue</u>, cosponsored by the MMS Committee on Occupational and Environmental Health and the Greater Boston Physicians for Social Responsibility. It drew national expert speakers and a worldwide audience.

- The 2021 Annual Oration, *Responsiveness and Resilience: Leading through Public Health Crises*, was delivered by Monica Bharel, MD, MPH, who was then senior advisor to the Mayor of Boston. She previously served as commissioner of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health during the first 16 months of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The 132nd Annual Shattuck Lecture, <u>Nucleoside-Modified mRNA-LNP Therapeutics</u>, was delivered by Drew Weissman, MD, PhD, a physician-scientist and pioneer in the science of immunology whose work, with his colleagues', paved the way for the first mRNA vaccines, and in turn the COVID-19 mRNA vaccines.

# *NEJM Evidence,* a New Digital Journal from NEJM Group, Launched in January 2022

Publishing high-quality studies from the front lines of medical research, *NEJM Evidence* seeks to advance clinical trial research and clinical practice by challenging the medical community to take new approaches to clinical trial design, execution, and analysis that yield more powerful clinical evidence. New, unique article types include *Stats, STAT!* videos, *Curbside Consult, Morning Report, Tomorrow's Trial,* and *Patient Platform. NEJM Evidence* is receiving a healthy number of manuscript submissions and revenue is ahead of expectations.



## NEJM Remains Committed to Supporting Antiracism in Medicine

The <u>Race and Medicine collection</u> at <u>NEJM.org</u> reflects our ongoing commitment to understanding and combating racism as a public health and human rights crisis. Articles published include educating the medical community about systemic racism, and supporting and improving the lives of physicians, aspiring physicians, and patients who are Black, Indigenous, or people of color. Also available for download is the <u>Racial Disparities in Clinical Medi-</u> <u>cine</u> e-book that includes interviews with clinician leaders, NEJM Perspective articles, and NEJM Catalyst research covering how inequity persists, how it is experienced, and how we might begin to counter it.



# Al and Machine Learning for Health Care Delivery — NEJM Catalyst Delivers with Articles, Event, and Research

To help health care professionals understand AI and machine learning and how it can be used for patient care, NEJM Catalyst hosted a live virtual event in March 2022. The event offered insights into how AI is being used for primary care visits, cancer screenings, COVID-19 contact tracing, advance care planning, opioid prescribing, and more. In conjunction, *NEJM Catalyst Innovations in Care Delivery* published a special theme issue with articles, case studies, and interviews that show AI being used at multiple institutions for real improvement in health care. Members of the NEJM Catalyst Insights Council weighed in, sharing views that generated a robust research report.
